<u>"Grace and gratitude belong</u> <u>together like heaven and earth.</u> <u>Grace evokes gratitude like the</u> <u>voice of an echo. Gratitude follows</u> <u>grace like thunder lightening" (Karl</u> <u>Barth).</u>

I have four degrees, two masters, and two doctorates. The first three were for professional accreditation and sought under the law of guilt, but it was my Doctor of Ministry five years ago, I received with joy, and knowing that I was on the journey of salvation by grace, the journey of being grateful for life.

Paul tells us to <u>"work out our</u> <u>salvation,"</u> and there was one night many years ago, this hit me square in the face.

I came to San Francisco, full of guilt over my sexuality, my years of prostitution. I worked my ass off ministering to my young sex workers, trying to absolve myself of my own guilt.

One cold night Sean, was standing on the corner looking for a date, and needed clean harm reduction supplies, and some food. As we talked, he simply blurted out, <u>"River</u> you really must have done a hell of a lot stuff wrong to hang out with us, to care for each one of us." These words from Sean, a young street kid, hit me in the face, and in the days, months, and years since have stayed with me. Those words have lead me on my own journey of gratitude and grace.

And in this journey, the grace of Jesus of Nazareth, and gratitude has blossomed.

As I walk this journey I thank God for the wisdom of Sean, and the care he gave in those moments. Sean reminds me that every homeless person I minister to have words of wisdom. They are so valuable. I thank God for being with me as I "work out my salvation" in gratitude for his love, so much gratitude, as the Apostle Paul best expresses in these words from Romans 13:8-10 (today's lectionary Scripture):

"Owe no one anything, except to love one another, for the one who loves another fulfills the law....the commandments are summed up in this word, "Love your neighbor as yourself." Love does no wrong to a neighbor; therefore love is the fulfilling of law."

Life is the greatest gift we have from God, however we came to be, and God calls us to <u>"love one</u> <u>another",</u> and in that loving we find

grace and gratitude. Deo Gratias! Thanks be to God!
